Over the past 6 months since I took on the role of plant manager in Platin the whole team here has been busy running the cement factory, completing our annual overhaul and welcoming many visitors to Platin to see first-hand how we make cement.

Last year, 2022 was a record year for fossil fuel replacement, one of our key goals in decarbonising our cement product. Thanks to our new EPA licence we have been able to gradually reduce our fossil fuel imports as we work to hit our target to get to 80% fossil fuel replacement by 2030.

As you can see in this newsletter many of the Platin team have been involved in community projects with local schools and clubs. Some of my colleagues have even gone back into the classroom as part of our support for local education programmes. We are proud to be part of the community for 50 years and we look forward to welcoming more visitors to our site in 2023.

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10 YEARS OF DROGHEDA SAIL TRAINING BURSARY



The Drogheda Sail Training Bursary, established 10 years ago in 2013, was the first of its kind in Ireland. Through the ongoing support of a group of local sponsors, including Irish Cement, the bursary has provided an opportunity for 150 young people from Co Louth and Co Meath to spend time at sea on sail training adventures run by Sail Training Ireland.

For each of the trainees the voyages can be challenging, both physically and emotionally. Under the guidance of experienced crews, the trainees work together to complete the daily tasks aboard a sailing vessel. They are often out of their comfort zone, working and living closely with others who may have come from different backgrounds. The voyages at sea help build resilience and selfconfidence in the trainees. They are encouraged to work as a team and value each other's contributions as they battle the elements and the heavy sails. The overwhelming response when the trainees return to shore is that they have had a positive life-changing experience.

With a renewed commitment from the original sponsors and new sponsors coming on board, the bursary is set to grow and provide this wonderful personal development opportunity to more and more young people.

Extensive maintenance and repair work is carried out each year during the site overhaul. For many months leading up to the overhaul a long list of tasks is identified and planned, spares, equipment and materials are ordered and stored on site in advance. Responsibility for each task is assigned and the work is scheduled. In addition to our own workforce up to an additional 250 specialist contractors are also on site for the overhaul. In the photograph a section of the raw mill is being reassembled before being lifted back into place. Safety of all activity on site is a daily priority and even more so during the overhaul when so many people are working on site.
