In September, Platin hosted site tours for delegates from a Global CemFuels conference which this year was held in Dublin. Visitors from all around the world attended the conference, some from other cement companies and others who are experts in alternative fuel equipment and supply. The day went well and the weather conperated thankfully

Our use of fossil fuels to heat the cement kiln continues to decline as use of two alternative fuels, SRF and solvents, grows. Working closely with our suppliers the SRF and solvents are delivered to agreed quality specifications. The fuels are stored temporarily on site in their own dedicated storage facilities before being transported into the kiln. We remain on track to reach the target of 80% fossil fuel replacement by 2030.

We continue to host site visits by local schools, colleges and customers, and we have more visits planned over the coming months. We are also continuing to work with Hugh Sweeney the wildlife photographer and were delighted to see his recent video and photography of the varied flora and fauna on the Platin site.

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PLATIN'S PINE MARTENS



We were delighted to see recent video footage of Pine Martens living on site in Platin. Hugh Sweeney our wildlife cameraman has been setting trail cameras on site this year and one of the species he discovered when he reviewed the video footage was this Pine Marten.

Pine Martens, one of Ireland's rarest mammals, faced near extinction by the 20th century due to hunting, habitat loss, and poisoning. Legal protection since 1976 has helped its population recover slowly in Ireland. Pine Martens, related to stoats, otters, and badgers, are about the size of domestic cats. Although they are largely nocturnal, they can be active during the day, especially in the summer. Their large feet, ears ringed by pale fur, and long bushy tails are distinctive features, along with their rich brown coat and pale-coloured chest patch. They spend a lot of time in trees, hence their Irish name, "cat crainn," meaning "tree cat." Their natural dens are often found in hollow trees, rabbit burrows, squirrel dreys, tree roots, and rock crevices.

Pine Martens have a varied diet that includes berries, fruits, insects, frogs, birds, small mammals, and carrion. They are solitary, slow-reproducing animals with breeding occurring once a year, with two or three kits born in the spring. The kits are born blind and hairless, relying entirely on their mother for the first 40 days.
